### Open Letter: Commission a new, independent review on trapping

Dear Minister Myers,

We write with deep concerns over a report commissioned by the Government of Prince Edward Island to review trapping in the province. In your statement in the PEI General Assembly on November 28, 2023, you had asked the department to commission an "independent review of trapping and snaring in Prince Edward Island".<sup>1</sup>

The commissioned report is titled, *A review of regulated fur trapping in Prince Edward Island (Epekwitk)*, authored by Pierre-Yves Daoust and was tabled November 28, 2023.<sup>2</sup> This report has numerous and serious flaws, and should not be used to inform decision-making over the future of trapping in the province. Primary among our concerns is that the author of the report appears to have ties to the fur industry which were not disclosed in his report, and therefore his assessment should not be considered independent.

### We urge the province to commission a new, independent report, one that is free from real or perceived fur industry bias.

Impartiality and objectivity are paramount in public policy decisions that affect the citizens of Prince Edward Island, especially the issue of trapping, a licensed, commercial activity that poses a risk to public safety and harms both domestic and wild animals. While the views of various stakeholders and perspectives should be considered in decision-making around trapping, affiliations must be disclosed, and the influence of competing interests balanced. This report lacks the impartiality, independence, and analytical rigour needed for the province to make informed policy decisions around commercial and recreational trapping. It should be viewed as a pro-trapping perspective, not as an objective assessment of a pressing public safety and ethical issue of importance to Prince Edward Islanders.

We highlight two key areas to demonstrate the problems with this report below.

### 1) Undisclosed fur industry affiliation and pro-trapping bias

The author of the report is currently (as of December 5, 2023) listed as a team member for Canadian Seal Products on its website.<sup>3</sup> Canadian Seal Products is a marketing project run by the Fur Institute of Canada (FIC), a national fur industry

lobby group that promotes trapping.<sup>4</sup> The author did not disclose his connection to the FIC in his report. This undermines the credibility and independence of this review.

The author's pro-trapping bias can be seen in an article written by the author for *The Canadian Trapper* magazine and published on TruthAboutFur.com, a website and blog that, *"provides a voice for the North American fur industry"*.<sup>5</sup> In this article, the author writes about an allyship with trappers.<sup>6</sup> More recently, in a CBC PEI radio interview that aired November 30, 2023, the author stated that, *"I have attended annual meetings of PEI Trappers Association for several years in a row*,"<sup>7</sup> highlighting his regular involvement in the province's trapping sector.

These points can help explain the overtly pro-trapping conclusions made in the report. Among these include that the public pay for the services of trappers (p.25), that the public support trappers by buying fur garments (p.25), and that PEI should expand the number of trappers in the province (p.26).

Given the author's undisclosed affiliation with the fur industry, self-proclaimed allyship with trappers, and involvement with the province's trapping sector, your government cannot accept this report as independent advice.

### 2) Major omissions and flaws

This report fails to include critical information that the province requires to make balanced, evidence-based decisions around trapping. The following are key issues that the report either failed to address or downplayed their importance.

 <u>Public Safety</u> - The report did not adequately address an issue of *current, significant importance* to the citizens of PEI: that traps are a public safety risk and are injuring and killing companion animals. Hundreds of citizens recently signed an official petition calling for a prohibition on trapping, highlighting the issue of pets becoming injured and killed by traps in the province.<sup>8</sup> Through freedom of information legislation, our organization obtained data from the province on the number of reported incidents of companion animals becoming caught in traps and snares in recent years. This data was not included in this report, despite its significance to the public interest and fundamental importance in a review on trapping. The data is included in Table 1 below, with the records included in Appendix A.

#### Table 1: Information obtained from the PEI Department of Justice and Public Safety

As a provincially licensed activity, the province has a responsibility and duty of care to protect the public from the dangers of trapping, an essential consideration that policymakers need to factor in their assessment over the future of trapping in the province. Questions regarding liability and negligence over trapping's dangers to the public were not covered. Recommendations to implement simple mitigation measures such as mandatory warning signs for active traps were not offered.

• <u>Non-lethal approaches to wildlife management.</u> The report emphasizes the role of trapping in wildlife management but does not include data to support the need for trapping for wildlife management in PEI nor any population data specific to the province. The author observes, "Most populations of furbearers in Prince Edward Island *appear to be doing well...*" (Emphasis added, p.7), an uncited statement characteristic of a personal anecdote. Despite the absence of furbearer population data and scientific grounding for trapping in the report, there are evidence-based, non-lethal alternatives to wildlife management that the report fails to cover (other than a footnote on page 3, dismissing flow devices for beavers as being expensive requiring regular maintenance). The author notes that 140-200 beavers were removed annually under a "nuisance beaver permit" in PEI since 2020 (p.3). Beavers are a prime example of a species where non-lethal, evidence-based alternatives to trapping have been successfully implemented in jurisdictions across North America, yet this literature is absent in this report.<sup>9</sup>

A glaring omission in the report is reference to the state of California, which not only banned commercial and recreational trapping in 2019<sup>10</sup>, but also shifted its policies to protect beavers in 2023, <sup>11</sup> which includes millions in funding to support non-lethal approaches to beaver management. <sup>12</sup> This omission demonstrates the report's lack of rigour and cherry-picked examples, as the author included the experience of Massachusetts banning traps in 1996 to highlight shortcomings of the ban (p.6).

- <u>Uncertified, inhumane snare traps.</u> The public interest importance and public safety risks of snares cannot be overstated, as these devices are responsible for most of the trapping incidents involving dogs in PEI in recent years. Yet this report fails to explicitly inform policymakers that snares are *not* certified traps under the Agreement on International Humane Trapping Standards (AIHTS), despite their common use in PEI and across Canada. Rather than recommending a pause or prohibition of these inhumane devices, the author suggests that powered killing neck snares should be used, in part because their use would, "imply a higher likelihood of dogs being killed if inadvertently caught." (p.27)
- <u>Social and ethical considerations</u>. The author notes that there are only 44 members in the PEI Trappers Association in 2023 (p.4). Contrast this with PEI's population of 173,787 (as of July 1, 2023). <sup>13</sup> The report fails to weigh the private interests of a handful of individuals that financially benefit from this activity against the values and attitudes of the general public. A 2023 public opinion poll found that 77% of Canadians oppose killing animals for their fur, with 67% of those in the Atlantic region opposed to the practice. <sup>14</sup> This survey shows majority opposition towards with practice across all political party leanings. A discussion into the ethics of trapping wildlife for commerce and recreation was entirely absent in this report.

<u>Trapping exclusions.</u> In the report's conclusions, it fails to present a balance of policy options, instead
recommending a pro-trapping status quo where the trapping regime should be expanded. The failure to consider
multiple options speaks to a lack of objectivity, balance, and nuance that policymakers should demand in assessing a
topic as controversial, harmful, and dangerous as trapping.

For example, a legislative ban on commercial and recreational trapping may include trapping exclusions that address specific concerns raised in the report while mitigating risks and harms. A prohibition on commercial and recreational trapping could be introduced alongside trapping exclusions for public health purposes, wildlife control as a last resort, and Indigenous trapping. For the latter issue, Indigenous trapping rights are protected in Canada. A provincial ban on commercial and recreational trapping for non-Indigenous trappers in PEI would not infringe nor interfere with Indigenous harvesting rights, a point not considered or mentioned under the report's section: 'Trapping and fur – An Indigenous perspective' (p.24).

There are numerous other issues in this report that deserve a response, from the subject matter itself to its reliance on decades-old sources. However, for the sake of brevity, it should be clear from the above that this report has serious defects and should not be considered an objective, independent review of trapping in PEI, but as a pro-trapping perspective that uses selective information to affirm and expand a trapping status quo.

On the issue of trapping, the citizens of PEI deserve evidence-based policies informed by credible information and sound science. To maintain public trust and ensure good governance, the province must scrutinize the nature of information presented to them as 'independent'. Pro-trapping essays by affiliates of fur industry lobby groups should not be considered independent nor impartial. It is for these reasons that we ask you to dismiss this report and commission a new, independent report.
